For the Fallen - a seven stanza poem first published in Britain in *The Times* September 1914. In one of the first battles of WW1, the British Expeditionary and Allied Forces had suffered great loss at the *Battle of Mons* on the Western Front, in August 2014. Binyon wrote the poem to honour the fallen and over time the 3rd & 4th stanzas of the poem became known as *Ode of Remembrance*.


The postcard titled *The Battle of Polygon Wood* is from an original painting by War Artist, Arthur Pearse. The description on the reverse side: "One of the most inspiring and historic events during the Battle of Polygon Wood, Belgium, was the planting of the Australian flag on Anzac Redoubt at 7.15am, 20th September 2017, by Lieutenant AVL Hull, 18th Battalion". He was killed in action three weeks later. The postcard was produced for sale, with all profits directed to the Australian Comforts Funds. AWM H00563

Note: Subsequent ANZAC Australian/New Zealand partnerships continued during WW2, the Malayan Emergency, Korea, Indonesian Confrontation and Vietnam. Although the term ANZAC originally referred to the ANZAC Corps of WW1, it has since become inclusive of all conflicts where both countries have contributed service men and women.

The K-CHS *We Remember Them* publication was launched on the 11th November 2015, at the RSL Hall Richmond, following the 11am service at Richmond War Memorial. The publication was produced by members of K-CHS in memory of all who served in WW1 from The Kurrajong, Colo and surrounding districts. The book was presented on the day to descendants, who came from near and far. Publication of the book was made possible by an ANZAC 2015 Centenary Grant from the Department of Veterans' Affairs. 

Charlotte Waring Atkinson(Barton)

Much has been written about Louisa Atkinson and her time in Kurrajong Heights. In an earlier Millstone I described her as "the most interesting person to have lived in Kurrajong Heights". At the time I had only very sketchy information about her mother. I really just knew that she was reputed to be the author of the first childrens book published in Australia and that she had "an interesting life". But of course it was Charlotte who brought Louisa to Kurrajong Heights, and shared ownership of their property here in the 1860s.

Now much more has been revealed about just how interesting her life was with publication of a fascinating book *Searching for Charlotte*, written by two of her greatgreat-great-great-granddaughters, Kate Forsyth and Belinda Murrell, descendants of Louisa's sister, Charlotte Elizabeth. They too had only some information about their ancestor, mostly focused on her background at Oldbury, in the Southern Highlands. They set out to find more, and what they reveal in the book is that Charlotte rivals Louisa as "the most interesting person to have lived in Kurrajong Heights".




The book is part biographical detail, part an adventure of discovery, in England and in Australia, with much very enthusiastic, even breathless, writing. They track her middle class up-bringing, her education, her early career as a governess in England, her remarkable decision to take a job in Australia, employed by the Macarthur family, at Riverstone of all places. That didn't work out, as she had met her husband, James

Atkinson, on the trip, and ended up with him at Oldbury. After his tragic death, she made an unfortunate marriage, suffered various hardships, (her husband was later charged with a murder) and lived in Sydney, where she won a landmark court case to get legal custody of her children. Meanwhile she generated a variety of sketchbooks, paintings and writings. Many of the sketches anticipate Louisa's.

So when she brought Louisa to Kurrajong Heights (for the benefit of her health), how did she spend the time? Unfortunately, Kate and Melinda leave a gap here – I have been trying to elicit more information, but I have had no success. We can only assume that she assisted her daughter in her botanical, artistic and educational activities, as it is not likely that she would have been idle. Also she had been entirely responsible for Louisa's education, perhaps her greatest

achievement. But she was not well, and it was her ill-health which took both of them back to Oldbury. Charlotte died in 1867, five years before Louisa's tragic death.

180 years ago, Australia's first children's book was published by an anonymous writer known only as 'a lady long resident in New South Wales'. The identity of the author was one of Australia's most puzzling literary mysteries until 1981, when she was finally given a name: Charlotte Waring Atkinson.

A History of Uplands Bells Line of Road Kurrajong Heights

This comfortable home was built for Henry Edward Peck (Ted) and his wife Julia (nee Leidich), in circa 1895. Ted was the eldest son of Henry and Mary Peck of Mountain View guest house on Burralow Road, the first guest house in Kurrajong Heights, which they owned and ran for 40 years. Julia was the daughter of John William Leidich, Douglas Road Kurrajong Heights.

The Hawkesbury Herald dated 6th June 1902 read: "Uplands is right on the main road - the old cattle road to and from Bathurst. It is a pretty building built mainly from stone quarried from its 30 acres". The property had been part of the original 1831 grant of 60 acres to John Sherwood.

Stone from the 'Uplands gully', was also quarried to build St David's Church Kurrajong Heights and the Belmore Lodge guest house further up the Heights.

When Henry Edward (Ted), built the Kurrajong Heights Hotel in 1927/1928, Julia and Ted moved from Uplands to live on the second floor of the hotel. Uplands remaining a Guest House.

At this time all the guest houses at Kurrajong Heights were supplied with piped water from the Heights Hotel. The water was pumped from the weir in Burralow Creek, to an in-ground tank above the hotel.

The Pecks also had a dairy and piggery approximately a kilometre west of Cut Rock, supplying milk, cream, butter, eggs, meat etc., to the hotel and their guest houses at Kurrajong Heights, including Allambie. The farm assisted in disposing of the kitchen waste from the guest houses.

The adjacent image is of a business card indicating the tariff for Uplands guest house, circa early 1900s. Note the phone number Kurrajong Hts. 1 in the upper left hand corner.

In 1950 under Theo Hughes Uplands became a weekend retreat for "The Womens League of Health", a world wide exercise phenomenon founded by Mary Bagot-Stack in England in 1930. The Australian branch formed in 1935, offered exercise classes for those "who would bestir themselves physically and mentally".

Below are a few entries taken from The Visitors Book at the Uplands Guest House

23rd November 1905 I came to *Uplands* for a weeks rest and change of air and in that time gained 8lbs. in weight. I then went to Katoomba for the following week and lost 2lbs... of course I am back in Kurrajong. G Allen *Allendale* Sydney, Randwick.

17th January **1906** I fully appreciate Mrs Pecks kindness and attention on this my second visit. I hope the day isn't far distant when I shall again enjoy the rest and pleasure of *Uplands*. A.R. Grant, Bulli.

20th January 1906 My wife and I have enjoyed a very pleasant fortnights holiday at Uplands. The climate is A.1. The food of the best and most plentiful and the accommodation all that could be desired. Mrs Peck being attentive in her endeavours to make all her visitors "at home" and happy. Henry Gallain, A. Gallain, Parramatta.

20th **April 1906** On three separate occasions, in periods varying from three weeks to one, I have visited *Uplands* in quest of health and quiet rest. The *Uplands* air, *Uplands* home comforts and attention, and *Uplands* cooking, form a trinity of realities that make it the ideal retreat for those desiring the things named. Mr & Mrs Peck are kindness itself in this excellent home. L.W. Trico, Waverley.

28th **April 1906** Have spent a most enjoyable time at *Uplands* and cannot speak too highly of the kindness and attention of Mrs Peck, also her beautiful cooking. I can recommend this as an ideal place for a rest. L, A, & H Eastow, Petersham.

September 1906 Being Sunday ...the scriptural phrase naturally arises, 'How beautiful upon the mountains'. Near and far the scenery is beautiful and though distance may lend enchantment to the latter, around this spot is some grand bush and mountain scenes. Have been listening this morning to a phonograph with some of the best music composed in the world, here in the Australian bush. Though not altogether in the bush! 15th **December 1906** A few words of appreciation for the great kindness showed us by the host and hostess of *Uplands*. Away from the bustle of the busy city and the noise and dust of trains etc., this is an ideal spot for a rest. You can find everything you require to make you comfortable and happy. Mrs Peck is an excellent cook. Wishing her and hers 'A Merry Christmas and a Prosperous New Year. Nellie Lichtacheindl, Pfahlerts Hotel, Sydney.

21st February 1907 Always pleasant to return to Uplands. Mrs Pecks kindness is unfailing. G. Wilson.

22^{*nd*} July 1907 I have much enjoyed my first visit to Kurrajong Heights – thanks to the kindness and attention of Mrs Peck – hope to visit again some day. Helen Woodruff, Chatswood.

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THE FOUNDATION OF KURRAJONG HEIGHTS Part 2 (cont. from the November-December 2020 Millstone Issue)

From the perspective of a heritage architect (Grahame Edds), the "General Store and Post Office building is a well constructed and simply detailed Georgian style building built high above the ground surface. Visual inspection revealed that this structure was built with some form of prefabrication inherent. This is evident particularly in the floor-to-wall framing as viewed from under the building. It is also interesting to note that the internal wall cladding of the attic rooms appear to be reused packing case timbers. Wall cladding externally consists of sawn vertical timbers with beaded timber joint cover battens machined to a high standard.....Little is known of its origin, however verbal evidence from inhabitants of Kurrajong Heights revealed that this building



may have been one of the exhibits in the Great Exhibition of 1851 held at the Crystal Palace, England, and afterwards shipped out to its present site. Research so far cannot substantiate this claim."

"The building has an attached but separate out-building of similar construction and form which was probably used as the cooking and washing area. Other out-buildings associated with the sale of petrol are unsympathetic. The building has been added to (during this study period) along the road frontage to the north western side and is a well constructed sympathetic addition. The original curved top window fabric has been removed from the three dormer windows. Other detail has been faithfully retained.

The General Store and Post Office is a fine example of an early Victorian timber framed and clad structure which together with the buildings adjacent forms the focus of the southern vista. The building is considered to be of high individual significance and essential to the character of the village."

The local belief that the building was shipped out to New South Wales as a prefabricated structure cannot be substantiated. A fire partly destroyed this building over ten years ago. One of the firemen who fought the fire commented that the timber he had to cut through to get into the building was ironbark, an Australian hardwood. This does not support the prefabrication theory. Also, the suggestion that the building may have been an exhibit in the 1851 Great Exhibition in England is totally without basis. From the *Official Catalogue of the Great Exhibition of the Works of Industry of all Nations, 1851,* it can be seen that

there were no full scale buildings on exhibition. The interior of the Great Exhibition building was divided into small display areas. While there were some models of some industrial buildings and structures such as bridges, there were no models of simple houses. The outside of the Exhibition building contained some displays, such as statues, stone and building materials, but no full scale buildings. The suggestion makes an interesting story, but with no basis in historical research. Some elements of the building might have been constructed off-site and shipped to the site, as might happen in building construction today. The current fireplace appears to be constructed of local sandstone, without the more typical iron surrounds of the era.

This view of the Post Office looking from "Lochiel House" shows no building in the space between "Lochiel House" and the original "Douglass Cottage" structure. The previous photograph showed a building that was probably associated with the service station business. This space between the two buildings was then filled by the additions to the Post Office.

The following sketch (page 7) shows the eastern elevation with the additions that were made to the building in the 1980's.



A comparison of the photograph above with earlier photographs not only shows the additions but also, the simplification in the dormer window framing, with the window arches removed.

The former Kurrajong Heights Post Office and "Lochiel House" form the centre of the historic village of Kurrajong Heights. Their conservation remains a very important issue, from the point of view of both the impact of any highway upgrading and of the conservation of the cornerstone buildings of the village.

Colin George Want 1881-1953 was a bullocky, cattleman and grazier. Born in Queensland to William Want and Annie (nee Pitt 1844-1918). He farmed at The Slopes on land originally owned by a distant relative by marriage, William John.
